WAVING GOODBYE TO SUMMER AND HELLO TO FALL!

Summer at Boys & Girls Clubs of Santa Cruz County (BGCSCC) flew cross-curricular program throughout the summer. Daniel Guerra, by!

Whether it was field trips, Friday activities, or Project Learn programs, Club kids were busy combating summer learning loss, traveling the world with their Passport Project, making new friends, exploring the outdoors, and, most of all, having FUN!

This year, we took a holistic approach to summer camp by combining High-Yield Learning Activities (HYLA's) with fun and engaging programming to heighten Club kids' skills and confidence and avoid summer learning loss. HYLA's are activities that reinforce and enhance skills and knowledge from the school year in a summer camp structure. HYLA's include: cooking with food harvested from the garden, physical movement such as dancing, field games, dodgeball, swimming, or even playing at the park, and, hands-on activities in the art room, music room, and education room such as Pictionary, creating houses and cities, and working with Duolingo to practice foreign language skills.

In the Live Oak Education room, during designated Project Learn hours, Alejandro (Alex) Martinez, the Live Oak Education Director, engaged with the kids through academically stimulating math and problem-solving games where the kids had to work in teams to solve the problems. Alex used group games such as Pictionary and Jeopardy to teach them history, science, and math. Alex lead a creative writing course, encouraging kids to explore their creativity by providing a prompt for their stories. For instance, Alex required the kids to have a super hero, side kick, super power, and villain in their story. "I was amazed with what the kids came up with," he shares, "It was great to see them let their imagination free and see that by giving them a basic structure they naturally showed conflict in their stories without even realizing what they were doing!"

At the Downtown Clubhouse, our program directors used countries and cultures as a central theme to create a cohesive,

Education Director, teamed up with Deidre Lister, Art Director, and the Technology room, run by Program Specialist, Isabelle Hernandez, to engage the kids through one theme. Each week kids would travel to a different country, such as Ireland, China, or France. Daniel would teach the kids geography, history of the country, plus current customs, the culture, and the language. Daniel would encourage the kids to practice languages, especially Spanish and French on Duolingo or through worksheets.

Meanwhile, Deidre would be leading the kids in activities in the garden and art room, such as creating art and food based on the culture. In the Technology room, Isabelle created questions and tasks on the computers that reflect what they were learning in the other rooms. "Even if they are just going on Google and looking up a historical figure or attempting to answer a question I posed in my room, I am happy with that. Because they are able to come back to me and tell me something they learned and how they got that information," Isabelle shares.

To follow their progress in the Art room, kids filled out Passports throughout the summer, highlighting what they learned and their favorite part of the week. They also made posters for the Clubhouse to shares what they learned, as well as cooked meals to share with the Clubhouse.
