CARES Act Charitable **Giving Deduction**

Back 2 **School** I am more determined than ever before to ensure that we, as the guardians of future generations, fulfill our responsibility to do whatever is necessary to ensure their safety, help them reach their potential and achieve their dreams.

It would be disingenuous to declare that I know what our Club will look like 2 months, 12 months or 2 years from today. What I do know is that we will be here for kids and families just as we've done for the past 51 years. It may be an arduous journey but I am optimistic that we as a Club and community will overcome the challenges before us.

To date, BGCSCC has responded to the current crises by:

- Safely opening Clubhouses as quickly as possible to support families of first responders and emergency workers (served 43 youth from 4/13 5/29).
- Requiring direct-line staff to participate in 20 hours of social and emotional behavioral training.
- Lending our voice and our influence to the movement underway for true and lasting change for communities of color.
- Completing personal outreach via phone calls to 190 families.
- Creating and operating safe and fun summer camps serving 120 youth each 4-week session.
- Distributing 1,000 free Club-Kits-to-go!

- Offering members 157 hours of virtual learning and programming.
- Working closely with community partners to distribute information, food and support to those in need.

BGCSCC continues to have frequent conversations with school districts across the county to determine the most effective way the Club can help students and families navigate the upcoming school year.

Moving forward the safety and well-being of our Club members remains our foremost priority, and we will continue to share updates with you as quickly and transparently as possible.

We've had incredible support from our donors and corporate and community partners to get us started down our collective new path, but we know there is so much more we need to do for Santa Cruz County's youth. I am certain that with the expertise of our staff and the steadfast support of our community we will emerge stronger than ever before.

Thank you for your unwavering commitment to our mission and the families we serve.



COVID-19 Relief Strategy CARES Act Changes to Charitable Income Tax Deductions

CARES Act for Nonprofits – Friday, March 27, the Congress passed and the President signed into law the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act, a \$2 trillion economic stimulus package legislated to provide immediate relief for nonprofits. Changes include:



Donors who do not itemize deductions:

The new \$300 deduction from the CARES Act is specifically for those who don't itemize their deductions and would typically not get any tax benefit for donations. Since it's considered an above-the-line deduction, the IRS applies it when calculating your AGI.

In plain English, if you donate up to \$300 in cash* to a qualified organization, your AGI will be reduced by up to \$300—and you can still claim the standard deduction. Although not specifically addressed in the CARES Act, it is reasonable to assume that each spouse of a married couple should be allowed to each claim a separate \$300 deduction (for a total of \$600).

Donors who Itemize deductions:

For contributions of cash paid to charitable organizations in calendar year 2020 (and 2020 only), individual taxpayers who itemize are allowed to elect to claim a charitable income tax deduction up to 100% of adjusted gross income (AGI), computed without any net operating loss carryback to the taxable year.

Corporate and Business Donors:

For contributions of cash paid to charitable organizations in calendar year 2020 (and 2020 only), a corporation can claim a charitable income tax deduction up to 25% of the corporation's taxable income. This provision does not apply to contributions to a supporting organization, a donor advised fund, or non-operating private foundations.
